DuPont Firefighters Participate in Training Burn

The City of DuPont Fire Department had the opportunity to participate in a training burn in Lakewood in March 2008. The Haas family is rebuilding a more accessible home for Mary Haas who has been diagnosed with six life threatening illnesses and has been blind for five years, due to the side effect of one of the medications. The Haas family asked the fire department to burn the existing house to the ground in order to begin the project. The new home could be completed by the end of June.

The day prior to the burn, crews hung extra sheetrock and placed wood pallets in the house to allow for practice burns. Four City of DuPont firefighters went through the training, which lasted approximately four hours.

Once the burn started, crews were rotated through the building, where fires were set multiple times in order for firefighters to practice their live fire skills. City of DuPont firefighters Clint Jenkins, Dan Potts, Al Gasak, and Meghan Worf participated in the burn and enjoyed the training.



DuPont Fire and Police Departments Reward Safe Riders

The City of DuPont Fire and Police Departments will be rewarding non-motorized riders for their safety efforts with a Safe Rider Citation card. This program is intended to increase life safety on the streets and reduce the risk of injury. Biking is a fun way for DuPont children to be active and get outside, but can be dangerous if safety precautions are not followed. Head injury is the single most common type of injury sustained from bicycle crashes.

Riders wearing the proper safety gear and following the rules of the road will be given a Safe Rider Citation Card by law enforcement and fire department personnel. These cards are good for a complimentary cookie at participating Subway restaurants. One citation can be redeemed per person, per visit.

Safety Information About Pools and Spas

It may not seem like it, but summer is fast approaching. If you are considering installing a pool or spa there are a few things to be aware of.

- The State of Washington and our community has enacted safety regulations governing residential swimming pools — in ground and above ground.
- A Building permit must be obtained from the City of DuPont Building Services Division for any recreational pool with water 2 feet (0.6 m) in depth or greater.
- Contact your Residential Owners Association for rules and restrictions.

Private Residential Pools and Spas Drowning Facts and Prevention Tips Did You Know...

- Drowning is the second-leading cause of injury-related death for children ages 1 to 14 years in the US.
 - About 280 children under age 5 drown in residential swimming pools annually.
 - Each year in Washington, drowning accounts for an average of 24 deaths, 26 hospitalizations for near-drowning, and 110 visits to the emergency room for children ages 0-17.
 - Among children ages 1-4 years, most drownings occur in residential swimming pools. Most young children who drowned in pools were last seen in the home, had been out of sight less than 5 minutes, and were in the care of one or both parents at the time. (Washington State Dept of Health) Children are attracted to water. They can easily slip out a door to the pool or spa and fall in if there is no barrier. Once a child falls into the water, they usually don't scream or holler for help, they simply slip under the water quietly.
- Drowning deaths can be easily prevented:

INSTALL PROPER BARRIERS AROUND POOLS AND SPAS

Research shows that installing 4-sided fencing is one of the most effective ways to prevent drowning.

- Fencing should be at least 4 feet high surrounding all 4 sides of the pool or spa.
- Gates need to be out of a child's reach and be self-latching and self-closing.
- Although approved power safety covers with protected locks may serve as good barriers, follow the manufacturer's instructions to prevent a child becoming trapped under the cover. Lightweight pool covers are not solid and should not be used for safety purposes.
- Doors that have direct access to the pool or spa need to be equipped with an alarm that emits a loud audible warning when the door or screen is open. It should activate within 7 seconds of the door or screen opening and continue for a minimum of 30 seconds. Deactivation of the alarm will not be for more than 15 seconds and all deactivation switches will be located at least 54 inches above the threshold of the door.

RESTRICT ACCESS TO THE POOL – The Association of Pool and Spa Professionals (APSP) recommends being aware of objects (like tables and chairs) that may allow children to climb over barriers and reach the pool or spa. In addition, tree limbs and overhanging roofs should be removed or made inaccessible in order to prevent contact with the pool or spa.

MORE SUPERVISION – Supervision is one of the most important tools for preventing drowning. According to Safe Kids USA, drowning is a quick and silent killer. In the time it takes to

...cross the room for a towel (10 seconds), a child can become submerged.

...answer the phone (2 minutes), a child can

lose consciousness.

...sign for a package at your front door (4 to 6 minutes), a child submerged in the bathtub or pool can sustain permanent brain damage.

Proper Tree Pruning

It's the time of year when you notice the beautiful trees in your yard showing extra growth. A visit to the garden shed, pruners in hand, and you are ready to tackle those excess branches. But how much is too much? The amount of live tissue that should be removed depends on the tree size, species, and age, as well as the pruning objectives. Most trees should not lose more than ¼ of their total mass. Websites such as www.treesaregood.com, and www.arborday.org provide specific guidelines for pruning.

Proper pruning procedures result in safety, health, and aesthetics for your trees. Two procedures that should NEVER be conducted are topping and tipping. Topping, the pruning of large upright branches between nodes, is sometimes done to reduce the height of a tree. Tipping is the practice of cutting lateral branches between nodes to reduce crown width. For your personal safety, never prune trees near utility lines, instead, contact the city's Public Works Department.

The proper place to cut is just outside the branch collar that grows from the stem tissue at the underside of the base of the branch. On the upper surface, there is usually a branch bark ridge that runs mostly parallel to the branch angle, along the stem of the tree. A proper pruning cut does not damage either the branch bark ridge or the branch collar. When making the decision to remove branches, follow these guidelines:

1. Under 5 cm- go ahead
2. Between 5-10cm- think twice,
3. Greater than 10 cm- have a good reason

Mature trees require minimal pruning. Be sure to research your tree before you visit your garden shed for those pruners.

Automatic Sprinkler Systems Need Annual Maintenance!

Many homeowners install automatic irrigation systems for the convenience and peace of mind they get by knowing their lawn is getting just the right amount of water. They get their timers set and just know they'll save water and keep the landscape green while they are away on vacation or out of town. However, bliss turns to shock when homeowners install irrigation systems to conserve water, only to find out that their water bills have doubled or tripled since they installed their systems!

Signs your sprinkler system could be leaking

- **Broken sprinkler heads.** If a lawnmower or a vandal damages a sprinkler head, you will lose a great deal of water the next time your system runs.
- **Weak output.** You notice you're not getting coverage from sprinkler head to sprinkler head. Fixing a leak will make your system operate more effectively.
- **Brown spots on the lawn.** You may not be getting adequate coverage due to a leak in a sprinkler head or a water line or the foliage from plants in beds adjacent to lawn areas could be blocking the sprinklers.

• **Lowest sprinkler head runs after the system turns off.** Some low-head drainage is normal after the system has run, but there should not be a continuous stream. You can minimize low-head drainage by installing check valves in your sprinkler heads and lines.

• **Water meter has a continual slow spin.** If you have ruled out all possible leaks inside your home (such as toilet or faucet leaks), a slow spin may mean a leak in your irrigation system.

• **Wet or soggy spots in the lawn.** There may be an underground break in your irrigation line. Sometimes the leak is large enough to cause the turf to "float" on the surface. If you have ruled out surface water drainage issues, check for leaks.

• **Meter or valve boxes continually filled with water.** If you have ruled out surface water drainage issues, check for leaks.

• **Summer water bills higher than normal.** Make sure you are not over-watering your landscape by running the system too long or too often! If your water bills are considerably higher than usual, you may have a leak.

• **Using too much water?** Homeowners and even some professionals set the timers to water lawns too often, and often not deeply

enough to soak the root zone. They also water established shrubs and perennials 2-3 times a week, when they only need irrigation a few times each summer.

• **Another major problem with automatic systems?** They are set in early summer after a hot spell turns everything crispy, and never adjusted as the weather changes. Installing a rain sensor shut-off, or using the "water budget" feature can help fix this.

Fireworks Safety

As the 4th of July gets closer, remember to celebrate safely! According to Safe Kids Worldwide, each year, mostly within a few weeks of the 4th of July, more than 4,300 children ages 14 and under are treated in emergency rooms for injuries resulting from fireworks. Children ages 5 to 14 account for most of these incidents.

Fireworks, including sparklers, can cause serious burns as well as blast injuries that can permanently impair vision and hearing. Teach your children what to do if their clothing catches on fire — "stop, drop, cover your face and roll" — and how to call 911 in an emergency. Here are a few more tips for safe handling of fireworks:

- Light fireworks only on smooth, flat surfaces, and aim them away from buildings, dry leaves, flammable materials and spectators.
- Do not try to relight fireworks that malfunction.
- Do not carry fireworks in your pocket or hold them close to your face.
- Visit www.recalls.gov to make sure the pyrotechnic devices you are using are not subject to any safety recalls.
- Do not modify fireworks or use homemade fireworks.

For optimal safety this year, enjoy a public fireworks display!

City Regulations Pertaining to Fireworks

9.12.010 Limitations.

No person shall use or explode any fireworks within the City of DuPont except from twelve noon on the second day of July to eleven P.M. on the fourth day of July of any year; provided that the City Council sitting in regular or special session may, by motion, more severely restrict the time limit and place for, or completely ban the use of, fireworks when the City Council finds that conditions warrant a more severe restriction; provided, that this prohibition shall not apply to duly authorized public displays where the same are authorized pursuant to the laws of the State of Washington, or the ordinances of the City of DuPont. (Ord. 456 § 1, June 23rd, 1992; Ord. 481 § 1, Aug. 10th, 1993).

9.12.020 Violation--Penalty.

Any person found guilty of violating this chapter shall suffer a fine of not more than \$50.00 or community service in the City of DuPont for not more than 30 days or both. (Ord. 456 § 2, June 23rd, 1992; Ord. 481 § 2, Aug. 10th, 1993).

10.03.070 Fireworks.

The display, possession and use of fireworks is prohibited in all parks except with prior written permission from the City of DuPont. (Ord. 00-674 § 7)

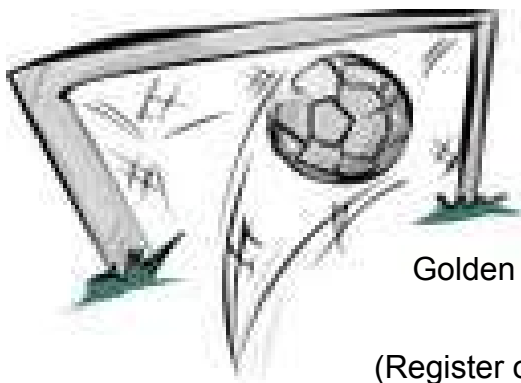
