### A Growing City with Many Challenges

It is probably not well understood how much time your elected officials spend studying issues and searching for solutions. Council members will attest that the job takes all of 40 hours a month, and that is a conservative number in the second half of the year when the budget process is in full swing. The management staff of the City work hard to support the many priority projects of the Mayor and Council. The following items are a hot list of things active in your City government at this moment:

- **The Civic Center Project:** If you have driven down Center Drive lately and looked at the Civic Center site you have seen heavy equipment excavating and grading for the three buildings that will be built on either side of the new road into the project. The new City Hall and Public Safety buildings will be on the north side of Civic Drive, and a Commercial office building will be built on the south side. At the current pace of activity we anticipate foundation work to begin in April.

- **Visitor Readiness Task Force:** This ambitious effort to brand and market DuPont is off to a fast start. Three subcommittees have been formed to focus on Cultural/Historical Assets, Marketing and Promotion, and Business Relations. Three tasks which are underway are an

updated trail and historical site map, a high quality DuPont Brochure, and improvement of all signs on I-5 and inside the City.

- **Parks and Greenway Service:** The City continues to struggle with the high cost of maintaining the many parks, greenways, trails, and open spaces in the City. An extensive analysis of the costs and alternative service level models were discussed at the March 11th Council meeting. Another dimension of this issue is the active recreation facilities at Powderworks Park and an increasing demand for recreation programs.

- **Fire and EMS Task Force:** The Task Force has been meeting for a couple months and is studying service levels and models for delivery of service. DuPont has a difficult geographic challenge with no adjacent cities that can be easy partners and help shoulder fixed costs. The expectation is that this group will provide recommendations which will guide the Council in the upcoming budget process.

These are the tip of the ice berg and an indication of the complex issues facing your City government. We invite all citizens to attend Council and special committee meetings and to visit our website for updates on the status of projects - [www.ci.dupont.wa.us](http://www.ci.dupont.wa.us).



## From the Museum and Historical Society

### Volunteer Recognition

At the March 17th Annual Meeting of the DuPont Historical Society, Carol Estep was honored for her volunteer work and continuing commitment to archiving the Museum collections. Carol organized a Bunko party to raise money for preservation supplies to care for our growing collections. The Bunko party was hugely successful thanks to the support of the Forever Young Seniors.

Carol began volunteering in 2007 and spends her Wednesdays cataloguing the Museum collections. Hazel Printz and Doris Stewart, longtime collections volunteers, have also been working with her to record and input our objects into the newly acquired Museum software program. During 2007 these ladies catalogued 995 objects, of which over 550 were new items donated to the Museum.

### Train Canopy and Restoration Project

Due to the efforts of Senator Mike Carrell and support from Senator Karen Fraser and Representatives Troy Kelley and Tami Green, the Train Canopy Project has received an appropriation of \$50,000 in State Funds. These funds are critical in assisting the City and Historical Society to meet its goal of protecting the Dynamite Train from further deterioration. Please contact these legislators to let them know how much the folks from DuPont appreciate their support of our community.

Karen Wiley is another terrific volunteer who has donated her time to work as a grant writer on the Heritage Capital Funds Grant, a collaboration of the City and Historical Society. This grant will be submitted in May to help fund the Train Canopy project.

### Traveling Trunks

The Hudson Bay Company and DuPont Company Town Trunks are completed and available for 3rd and 4th grade students. They are loaned at no charge to both area schools and homeschoolers, through a donation by the Richard and Elaine Robinson Heritage Fund. Assisting with the project are Lorraine Overmyer, Councilman Larry Wilcox, Historian Drew Crooks and Museum Manager Joh Jones.

### KLAY Radio's Live Remote from the Museum

KLAY radio host Al Knight brought his radio program to the Museum in March. Al interviewed Deputy Mayor Penny Coffey and City Administrator Bill McDonald about the branding of DuPont, and Joh Jones and Lee McDonald took listeners on a "virtual" tour of the museum. The program was sponsored by America's Credit Union.

### Website under construction

We are increasing public awareness of our museum by updating our website. Board Member Dr. Steve Shaffer has been working to create a user-friendly, 21st century website that will promote our history and events. It will be completed this spring.

## Historical Society and City of DuPont 30 year Partnership

The Historical Society and the City of DuPont have enjoyed a collaboration that has spanned three decades. The partnership began in January of 1977 when the DuPont Company announced the sale of its 3,200 acre Powder Works Plant to the Weyerhaeuser Company. Fearing much of DuPont's history would be lost, Mayor John Iafra appointed then City Councilwoman Lorraine Overmyer to form a historical group with the mission to preserve DuPont's history and rescue the artifacts. The group later became the Dupont Historical Society.

In June of 1977, the City designated the vacated City Hall, formerly the Carston's Meat Market, to be used as DuPont's first Museum to house the artifacts. The Historical Society was charged with operating it.

Had it had not been for this group of citizens and the foresight of the City, much of the DuPont's photos, documents and artifacts, including the Dynamite train, would have been lost.

Throughout the years the City has maintained the museum and the collection. It pays for the utilities, takes care of the grounds and provides administrative support for the Historical Society. And in 2006, under the leadership of Historical Society President Robby Robinson, the City hired Johanna Jones, our first museum manager. Over the last two years the museum has experienced a steady rise in visitors, an increase in volunteers and membership, and has tripled gift shop sales.

Currently the City and the business community are moving forward with the branding and promoting of DuPont as a historical and recreational destination. The Historical Society will continue partnering with the City and the citizens of DuPont to promote and preserve our history and to make DuPont known as the best place in Western Washington to live, work and play.

## Water Utility Payments

Many residents use their bank's on-line bill pay service to pay their water utility payments to the City. Your bank will print a check for the amount you designate and will mail it to the City for you. However, some checks arrive with incorrect utility account numbers, as some residents have moved from one home to another within the City and their account number changes with each move. City personnel have to spend time in the computer system investigating to make sure the correct utility account is credited.

Please check to make sure your water utility account is correct on your on-line bill pay check. You can find your current account number on your utility statement under account information.



## Help Us Protect Your Drinking Water Supply

The City of DuPont is aggressively working to protect your drinking water supply from contamination. Part of this effort is called the "Cross Connection Control Program". This program ensures that used or non-potable water, or other contaminants, do not enter our drinking water system. This program assures that customers take the proper precautions to prevent this type of drinking water contamination through annual inspection and testing, as well as by assuring that all plumbing code requirements are properly followed.

A cross connection is any temporary or permanent connection between a public water system or a consumer's potable water supply and any source or system containing non-potable water or other substances. An example is the piping between a public water system or a consumer's potable water supply and an auxiliary water system, cooling system or irrigation system.

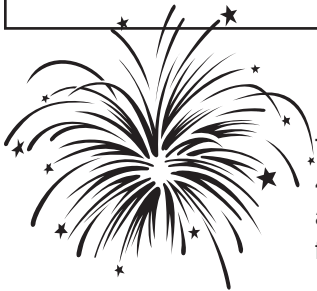
DuPont water system customers regulated by the "Cross Connection Control Program" will be contacted when the annual inspection and testing is due for their facilities. More detailed information is available by contacting the DuPont Public Works Department at 253-912-5381.

The City would also like to remind those DuPont residents who have landscape irrigation systems that you will soon be receiving your annual system backflow testing notices. These annually required tests ensure that water from the irrigation system does not "backflow" into the drinking water system.

If you are thinking of installing a landscape irrigation system on your property, you are reminded that a permit from the City of DuPont is required. Please contact the City Building Department at 253-912-5381 to discuss the permitting and inspection requirements associated with your irrigation system installation.

### Be Safe! Be Seen!

Pedestrian safety is important not only for pedestrians to remember, but for drivers as well. Being safe means being seen, no matter what time of day. Every year, thousands are injured in pedestrian related incidents, particularly involving children. Practicing safety measures with your family will help everyone to stay safe.

Below are a few things to remember, especially when children are present.

- Know the rules of the road. Cross the street at marked intersections and be sure to obey all traffic signals. Remember to look left, right, and then left again for traffic.
- Be on the correct side. Walk on the sidewalk. If there isn't one, walk on the left side of the road, facing on-coming traffic.
- Never leave a child unattended. Children should always be accompanied by an adult. Be sure to hold the child's hand, especially when crossing the street.
- Be seen. If walking in the dark, remember to wear light-colored clothing and or clothing with reflective material so that drivers can see you. It is also a good idea to have a flashlight.
- Watch for toys. If a toy or pet goes into the street, children should learn not to run out to retrieve it. Have them ask an adult for help. Drivers should be aware of small children playing and to drive slowly, especially in residential areas.
- Play in the right place. If your children are playing outside, it is safest for them to play in the backyard or away from the street.
- Pull over. If you are tired or your driving is impaired for any reason, do not drive. This increases risk for drivers and pedestrians.

It is important for everyone to know and follow the rules of the road for their own safety. Practicing these rules as a family strengthens their message and brings awareness to the importance of pedestrian safety.

Last year, more than 60 students at Chloe Clark Elementary in DuPont participated with the City of DuPont Fire Department in the annual "Walk This Way" event. The students, firefighters, and volunteers walked to school from Clock Tower Park, practicing all of the traffic rules they learned. Join us for this year's event on October 1st for some fun and safety!

### Poisoning Prevention

Poisonings can be a common household problem, if proper precautions aren't taken. Every year, Poison Centers throughout the country answer approximately 1.2 million calls for unintentional poisonings among children ages five and under. Children have a faster metabolism than adults, making anything that they ingest absorb into their bloodstream quickly.

Below are a few things to remember, especially when children are present. Children are curious:

- About 3 out of 5 cases involve non-pharmaceutical products such as cosmetics, cleansers, personal care products, plants, pesticides, art supplies, alcohol and toys.
- The same appealing colors and fragrances that attracted you to buy a product could also attract your child to smell and swallow that product.

- Child-resistant packaging is not childproof. Most two-year-olds can open a child-resistant container in 4 to 5 minutes.

Poisons in your home may be invisible.

- Carbon monoxide is a deadly gas that is difficult to detect because it is invisible, tasteless, and odorless. Carbon monoxide is produced by everyday fuel-burning appliances and equipment found in the home.

- Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home for early detection. Remember that carbon monoxide alarms cannot detect smoke, so both alarms are important to have!

Medicines are helpful, but can be dangerous.

- Be sure that medications are taken in the proper dosage. Do not refer to the medicine as "candy" when giving it to a child.

- Keep medications and other potentially harmful substances in their original containers with their original labels, and flush expired medications down the toilet.

Know what to do in case of a poisoning emergency. Not all poisonings will have symptoms. If someone in your home has ingested a substance, call the Poison Center from anywhere in the United States at 1-800-222-1222. The Poison Center is open 24 hours a day, including holidays. Be sure to call 911 if someone is choking, having difficulty breathing, or having a seizure.

## Displaying the American Flag



A lot of homeowners display their American flag all year, and some fly them occasionally through the year, such as Armed Forces Day (3rd Saturday in May), Memorial Day (May 26th), Flag Day (June 14th), Independence Day (July 4th), and Veteran's Day (November 11th). Whatever your inclination, make sure to observe flag etiquette when flying the American flag. Some etiquette rules, which apply to displaying the flag on your home, are:

When flying the flag from a pole, the American flag should always be at the top of the pole, unless the flag is at half-staff. If you wish to also display the state flag, it would be placed under the American flag.

When the flag is displayed from a staff projecting horizontally or at an angle from a window sill, balcony, or the front of a building, the union of the flag should be placed at the peak of the staff, unless the flag is at half-staff.

When the flag is displayed in a manner other than by being flown from a staff, it should be displayed flat against a wall, either horizontally or vertically, with the union uppermost and to the flag's own right, that is, to the observer's left. The flag may also be hung vertically from a window, roof eave, or other structural overhang, with the stars uppermost and to the observer's left.

The flag should never be displayed with the union down, except as a signal of dire distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.

If you display your flag at night, the flag must be properly illuminated. Proper illumination means that the stars and stripes can be seen readily from a reasonable distance. Flags on poles generally require a dedicated light. The reasonable distance criteria also apply to flags displayed at night on a residential home, and porch lights may not be enough illumination.

The flag should not be used as a drapery or for any decoration in general. Bunting of blue, white, and red stripes is available for these purposes. The blue stripe of the bunting should be on the top.

When the flag is lowered, no part of it should touch the ground or any other object.

When the flag is so worn it is no longer fit to serve as a symbol of our country and should be destroyed by burning in a dignified manner. Contact your local American Legion Hall or Boy Scout Troop to inquire about the availability of this service.

### Pet Licensing Reminder

As a reminder, the DuPont Municipal Code requires all dog and cat owners to license their pets at City Hall. Check the city website for current fees ([www.ci.dupont.wa.us](http://www.ci.dupont.wa.us)). If your pet has been micro-chipped for identification, be sure to bring that information with you at the time you license your pet. In addition to receiving a discount on your license, the information helps police and Animal Control officers identify your animal more quickly in the event the license is missing

at the time your animal is found. If your animal is missing and is not licensed in DuPont, it may have been picked up by Animal Control and taken to the shelter. Please contact the Pierce County Animal Shelter at (253) 383-2733.

### Alarm Permit Required

Per Section 9.15.020 of the DuPont Municipal Code, an alarm permit is

required for any residence or business with a working alarm installed, whether it is an audible or visual alarm or one that is monitored by an alarm service. That permit must be displayed in a visible location near your door so it can be easily seen by responding police officers. A violation of this ordinance could result in a civil infraction notice being issued to the home or business owner.

This permit can be obtained at DuPont City Hall by paying a permit fee of \$50.00 and completing a simple application.
